CARDIOMYOPATHY UK REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

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The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The charitable incorporated organisation was registered with the Charities Commission on 5 November 2015.. On 1 January 2016, the assets and liabilities amounting to £535,458 of The Cardiomyopathy Association (registered charity number 803262) were transferred to the charity which continues the work of the original association founded in 1989. Trustees formally closed the Cardiomyopathy Association on 31 December 2015 and entered it into the Charity Commission's register of merged charities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Cardiomyopathy UK is the national charity for people affected by the heart muscle disease cardiomyopathy. The charity exists to ensure that people with cardiomyopathy can live longer and fuller lives. This is achieved through:

- 1) Providing support and information services for people affected by cardiomyopathy to increase their understanding of the condition, provide skills and motivation to cope day to day and limit the damage to psychological well-being.
- 2) Working with healthcare professionals and clinical experts to enhance their ability to make appropriate diagnoses and improve treatment outcomes.
- 3) Raising awareness of cardiomyopathy amongst the general public to reduce the number of sudden and avoidable cardiac deaths through early diagnosis.
- 4) Campaigning to encourage policy makers and health service commissioners to improve access to quality treatment.
- 5) Increasing understanding of cardiomyopathy and its impact so that the charity can support the search for new treatments and ensure that its own work is effective.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Trustees are pleased to report that during 2016, significant progress has been made across all areas of the charity's activity and that the charity continues to grow and develop in-line with its strategic plan. Trustees would like to highlight the following achievements:

Providing support and information

In 2016, the charity was able to develop its core helpline service by offering new ways to access the helpline team and by offering support on a wider range of issues. This was achieved through the launch of a "live chat" service enabling individuals to connect online to one of the charity's helpline nurses and by increasing its ability to provide support for practical issues such as housing employment and benefit rights. Trustees are pleased to report that over the year the helpline was able to support 1,294 people. Over 98% of service users said that they found the service either "helpful" or "very helpful".

The charity also made a great deal of progress in developing its network of local support groups. These groups play a significant role in helping people feel better able to cope with the physical and emotional impact of their condition. Our network of local support groups held 42 meetings throughout the country and 88% of attendees reported that they felt more supported following a meeting. The value of this work was demonstrated to The Big Lottery Fund and trustees are pleased to report that funding has been granted for an ambitious development project that will greatly increase the number of support groups over the next three years.

During the year the charity made a conscious effort to extend the breadth of information resources that it offers and to ensure that its information is clear and easily accessible. This led to the production of a new animated video introduction to cardiomyopathy and the publication of a simple "fact-sheet" series covering the different forms of cardiomyopathy and related issues such as exercise.

The charity's website remains one of the main ways in which individuals come to the charity and improvements to the site during the year made it easier for individuals to access information resources and to read about other peoples' experiences of living with the condition. Over 105,000 people accessed our information during the year.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The charity was able to continue to provide local information days holding 5 events throughout the year. In November, the charity welcomed 300 people to the first ever national cardiomyopathy conference in London. As with local information days, this event was designed not only to improve attendees understanding of the condition but also to help them develop the skills and the support networks needed to cope day to day. Trustees are pleased to report that the feedback from information events clearly showed that these objectives were met. 98% of individuals reported that attending an event improved their understanding of cardiomyopathy, 78% reported that it improved their confidence to deal with the condition and 82% of attendees reported that they now felt able to manage their own health.

Working with healthcare professionals

Research undertaken by the Cardiomyopathy Association in 2015 revealed that over 35% of people with cardiomyopathy are misdiagnosed in primary care and that even some experienced cardiologists required more support to help ensure appropriate treatment of their patients with cardiomyopathy. This has motivated the charity to do even more to work with healthcare professionals in 2016.

During the year the charity held a national medical conference and two local training days one of which was held in partnership with the University Hospital Morecambe Bay and focused on peripartum cardiomyopathy. Trustees can report that that these events continue to be highly effective with 98% of conference attendees reporting that they felt better able to treat and manage a patient more effectively after attending our conference and 67% reporting that their ability to make an appropriate diagnosis had improved.

As well as education events, the charity also brought together local clinicians and NHS stakeholders across the south coast to help them to identify improvements to the services which they provide to people with cardiomyopathy in their area.

Campaigning and raising awareness

The charity believes that talking about cardiomyopathy can save lives and that there would be fewer avoidable deaths if more people recognised the symptoms of cardiomyopathy and were able to access the treatment they needed when they sought help. During the year, the charity was able to increase the amount of work undertaken to raise awareness of the condition and to be a strong advocate for people with cardiomyopathy.

The charity grew its database of people ready to share their story with the media and this enabled it to capitalise on free media opportunities during the year which reached in excess of 600,000 people. The charity was also able to reach more people through social media increasing its following by over 37%. This will continue to be an area of growth in the year ahead.

As well as traditional and social media activity, the charity played an important role in the development of a parliamentary enquiry into heart failure, providing evidence to the All Party Parliamentary group on Heart Disease to ensure that the specific needs of people with cardiomyopathy were considered.

The charity worked in partnership with the Alliance for Heart Failure, a collection of charities and clinical associations, to increase pressure on the government and the NHS to provide appropriate services for people with cardiomyopathy.

Research and increasing understanding

In 2016, the charity undertook its own research into the emotional impact of cardiomyopathy and presented the findings to leading cardiology and mental health professionals who helped to identify practical ways in which the emotional needs of people with cardiomyopathy could be dealt with more effectively.

The charity also brought together its clinical advisory group, a group of leading cardiomyopathy experts, to discuss cardiomyopathy research priorities and participates in the Heart Failure research forum to ensure that the needs of people with cardiomyopathy were understood by clinical researchers.

The charity also continued to promote involvement in cardiomyopathy research to the charity's service users and supported and invited researchers to attend our public information events.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Income

During the year the charity was able to meet the challenge of opening up new areas of income in line with its fundraising strategy. Trustees were pleased to see significant corporate support for the first time as well as the success of an application to the Big Lottery Fund to fund the development and expansion of the charity's network of local support groups. The charity's three year grant of £132,000 from the Big Lottery Fund will start in 2017. These developments enable the charity to build on the solid basis of income raised from groups and individuals which remains strong.

This new income, together with close management of expenditure enables the charity to report an unrestricted surplus of £30,025 for the year to 31 December 2016.

Reserves Policy

We aim to maintain unrestricted reserves at a level which equates to around six to nine months of normal unrestricted expenditure. Trustees believe this to be a prudent amount given that we operate in a competitive environment and, as the leading specialist provider of support services for people affected by cardiomyopathy, we have a duty to ensure that core services are maintained for individuals in need.

Future Plans

The charity's plans and objectives are agreed by trustees, staff, volunteers, service users and other stakeholders who review the charity's progress.

In 2017, the charity aims to build on the successes outlined above and to continue to develop its areas of activity so as to meet its overall objectives. In particular it aims to focus on:

Providing Support and Information

The charity aims to continue to broaden the scope of the helpline service in 2017 and in particular to increase its ability to provide peer support to individuals by recruiting and training a network of peer support volunteers.

The charity will also continue to build the support that it is able to provide for young people and their families. It will seek to create a young persons' panel tasked with identifying and developing services for young people and piloting these services to assess their efficacy.

Following the success of its video animation, further simple guides will be produced during the year and promoted heavily online and via social media.

Working with healthcare professionals

In 2017 the charity aims to reach a greater variety of healthcare professionals and is particularly keen to reach more professionals working in primary care and heart failure nurses. The 2017 national conference has been developed with this in mind.

The charity will also seek funding to produce and promote short video resources designed for GP's to improve their ability to diagnose cardiomyopathy and refer patients for appropriate treatment.

Campaigning and raising awareness

The charity will continue its national campaigning work in partnership with other relevant organisations. In addition to this, the charity aims to develop its own network of regional advocates who have the training and resources needed to work with local NHS organisations to develop appropriate services for people with cardiomyopathy.

The charity also aims to launch its first national media campaign with the aim of reducing mis-diagnosis by encouraging members of the public to tell their doctors about their family "heart history" and to recognise how a range of symptoms could indicate cardiomyopathy.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Research and increasing understanding

The charity aims to undertake research to increase its understanding of how different families approach the issues of screening and genetic testing when a family member has been diagnosed with cardiomyopathy. Insight into this issue will ultimately help the charity and healthcare workers to support individuals discussing screening with family members.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is controlled by its governing document and constitutes a charitable incorporated organisation. The charity is governed by its constitution adopted on 5 November 2015.

The charity continues to review and, where necessary, improve its trustee induction and training resources to ensure that new trustees are equipped to support the work of the charity to their maximum ability.

Appropriate policies and procedures have been put on place to ensure good governance including financial management, risk management and employment practice.

Related parties

The charity works closely with expert clinicians from a number of NHS Trusts to help ensure that its work is clinically appropriate and that it is able to reach as many people with cardiomyopathy as possible.

The charity has a positive relationship with The British Heart Foundation, The Pumping Marvellous Foundation and a number of other charities that provide support and information relating to heart diseases. Where possible, the charity works in collaboration with these charities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Cardiomyopathy UK is a charity limited by guarantee and incorporated in England and Wales. The charities principal address is Unit 10, Chiltern Court, Asheridge Road, Chesham, Buckinghamshire, HP5 2PX. The registered charity number is 1164263.

The presentation currency of these financial statements is Sterling (£), being the currency of the primary economic market in which the entity operates. All amounts in these financial statements have been rounded to the nearest pound unless stated otherwise.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

There are no existing material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the entity's ability to continue as going concern.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

Salaries have been apportioned in accordance with the duties to which they relate.

Premises costs have been apportioned on the basis of percentage of floor space used.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- at variable rates on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.
